ARTIST BIO

South Florida artist Deborah Perlman is a graduate of Boston University (BFA, sculpture) and Cranbrook Academy of Art (MFA, sculpture). After graduate school, Perlman ventured into communications, enriching her creativity through travel and special assignments. Since dedicating herself to art full time, she has been featured in several art publications and her work has appeared in exhibitions nationwide, including three solo exhibitions from 2023 – 2024. Her work is held in private collections, and she is a member of regional and national professional artist organizations.

Perlman creates abstract geometric 3-D collage by transforming flat shapes into elevated forms and spaces that add depth, texture, and shadows. She cuts, scores, and folds paper to create the forms, then combines them with materials like photographs, wood, and metal. Juxtaposing these forms, she highlights their points of contact and the shadows they cast, enhancing the intention for each piece.

Perlman finds inspiration from the form, structure and styles of African sculpture; the Constructivism, Geometric Abstraction, and Cubism art movements; the work of Louise Nevelson; the 'illogical perspective' of Giorgio de Chirico and M.C. Escher; Joseph Cornell's shadow boxes; and Frank Stella's metal reliefs, among many others. Her concerns for the environment, reactions to global conflicts, and personal life experiences contribute to the subject matter she addresses.



ARTIST STATEMENT

Enter a World Somewhere Between Real and Imagined

"My artwork transforms collage into three-dimensional sculptures, converting flat shapes into elevated forms and spaces that add depth, texture and shadows.

Using paper in rich tones, I cut, score and fold to create these forms, then combine them with photographs, wood, fabric, metal and other materials. The juxtaposition of these elements — casting shadows and highlighting contact points — enhances the intention of each piece.

The forms and spaces in my work exist somewhere between the real and the imagined. Each piece invites you to travel through doorways, walkways, ramps, and passages, leading you to spaces filled with mystery, questions, and the unknown. These paths may evoke feelings of peace, shelter, joy or wonder, and give you new insights into your perceptions.

My works are visual metaphors for issues that impact me, from environmental concerns and global conflicts to the quest for inner peace. I immerse myself in this 'almost-but-not-quite-real' world and invite you to join me.


Walk in and ask yourself: What is it? Where is it? What do I see and feel? And ultimately, do I find myself in it, or not?

Through these questions, I aim to foster deeper connections and understanding, encouraging introspection and the recognition of our shared experiences."

"This is the Book We Never Wrote" Series

About two decades ago, I began writing a collection of personal essays reflecting on life experiences, relationships, and milestones, with the intention of publishing them someday. When my son, Ari, learned of this project, he enthusiastically offered to illustrate each essay. We both embraced the idea wholeheartedly—Ari was an extraordinary artist, overflowing with spontaneity and boundless creativity. However, life had other plans, and Ari passed away in 2020.

Today, I bring our project to life through a 'book' of artworks. Each piece in this series represents one of my essays, with carefully selected excerpts subtly woven into the background. The 'chapters' of this book delve into themes of forgiveness, love, friendship, and healing. Throughout this creative journey, I have felt Ari's presence cheering me on. These artworks visually convey the essence of my essays as well as a deeper narrative of resilience and growth in the face of unimaginable loss.


"A World I No Longer Know" Series

I live in a world I no longer know. Borders closed, books banned, civil rights in reverse, women's choices diminished, diversity and inclusivity battered. In these artworks, people are depicted in silhouette—anonymous figures without specific identities, names, or faces. Is this how they appear to those who are shutting the door on their fundamental rights? These spaces of suppression and containment leave little room for the empathy, acceptance, and compassion I once knew.

"Nature-Tecture" Series


When I began this series, the first piece included only a few photos of nature. But as I continued, I noticed that more and more plants were making their way into my compositions. In Nature-Tecture #3, #4 and #5 the plants are bursting forth from behind the man-made forms, asking to be noticed. It was as if the plants were telling me, "We are here, we are important, and we are thriving." This realization became the heart of the series, and I hope it inspires the viewer to reflect on the delicate balance between our built environments and the natural world.

"Within" Series

The "Within" series explores space as 'restriction' versus 'protection.' Using a variety of materials including paper, wire mesh and aluminum wire, I created a series of gateways.

The spaces could be interpreted as constrained enclosures or places of safety and shelter. My choice of the wire mesh presents a dominant texture and pattern, begging the question: is it harsh or does it represent protection? I invite the viewer to wander into these spaces and decide for themselves.



"Altar" Series

These works depict my search for healing and peace when the world seemed to explode with war, death, divisiveness and hatred. I was drawn to the poetry of Judeo-Christian liturgy as well as the spaces found in houses of prayer. Themes of walking from shadow into light, dark mysteries of the inner sanctum, and the majesty of the holy altar inspired me to create spaces of shelter and protection.


